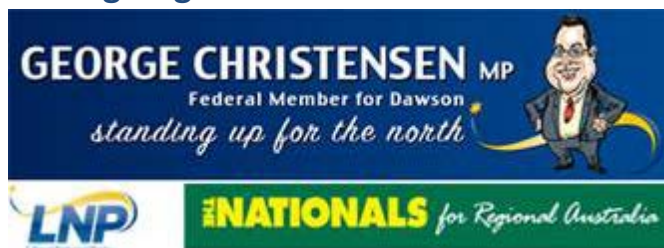

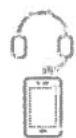

Is it "Our ABC" or the Green Left's ABC?

Dear Mr Lyons

The ABC's attack on Queensland jobs, disguised as a Four Corners episode, "Digging into Adani", on Monday night demonstrates beyond doubt the national broadcaster is overly influenced by the extreme green movement. The program avoided facts, preferring the green movement's stock-in-trade: allegations, accusations, and unsubstantiated claims. But no matter how many activists the ABC turns to for comment, repeating the same misinformation does not turn it into fact.

Monday's episode relied almost exclusively on commentary from other journalists and green activists, including the Institute for Energy Economics and Financial Analysis, which is funded by big (green left) money from the United States, including the Rockefellers. Their stated mission is "to accelerate the transition to a diverse, sustainable and profitable energy economy and to reduce dependence on coal and other non-renewable energy resources". In fact, even lightly scratching the surface of the experts and organisations reveals strong links with the green movement and funding from other activist organisations such as Greenpeace.


The lack of credible sources and repetition of the same old allegations, many of which are demonstrably false, indicate a disregard for objectivity. Monday's episode contained nothing new of any substance, just a continuation of the ABC's sustained attack on Adani, whose Carmichael Coal Project, when complete, will represent only 17 per cent of Queensland's coal production.

On behalf of North Queensland taxpayers and families desperately in need of jobs, I demand the ABC provide balance to this story by producing another story focused on the Townsville, Bowen, and Mackay communities relying on the Carmichael Coal Project going ahead.

By allowing itself to become a mouthpiece for green extremists, the ABC has distanced itself from the regional audience, who fund the broadcaster with their taxes. Regional-based journalists continue to engage with their local community but they are increasingly at odds with the Sydney-centric national programs. The national broadcaster still has an important role to play in regional and remote areas where options are limited. However, the Four Corners story is a clear example of capital city media elites talking amongst themselves and demonstrating a disdain for anyone outside their circle.

I would appreciate your immediate action on this issue.

The blowy weather made for rough going for the fisherman out on the water, but the event itself couldn't have sailed more smoothly.

More than 62 prizes were

handed out during the weekend, amounting to \$100,000 worth of giveaways.

Now in his 24th year organising the event, Russell McCabbin said it was the com-

munity involvement that kept people coming back.

"The town really gets excited about it," he said.

"We get several volunteers every year.

"People come from out of town to compete in the event, and bring the kids.

"The accommodation people love it and it's great for the economy."

AFTER eight years of court battles and bureaucracy rain has wrecked Adani's plans for a grand start to its development of the massive Carmichael mine and rail project.

Its planned ceremonial start to the project for last Friday was postponed because of concerns about the weather.

Adani chairman Gautam Adani was expected to attend the event as a powerful symbol of the company's support for the project.

The milestone event was to be held in the rail corridor land west of Moranbah.

In a letter to mining industry representatives Adani said the important milestone event comes "after nearly eight years of development and stringent approvals for our projects and is the latest in a number of significant achievements this year".

The delay follows threats from Greens leader Richard Di Natale threatening to do everything, including being arrested, to stop Adani's project going ahead as local activists called on people working for the company to become spies and inform on activities of the company.

By deadline for this issue, the Indian mining giant had yet to say when the rescheduled event will occur.



THE members of Force Support Element Seven act as the one-stop shop for all Australian Defence Force Personnel operating in the Middle East Region.

Based at Australia's main operating base in the MER, the group supplies and distributes uniforms, clothing, stationery, weapons, ammunition, mail and other items to all ADF personnel, as required.

They also organise purchase orders for items such as furniture as a means of contributing to the local economy.

A majority of personnel are from the Townsville-based 10th Force Support Battalion (10FSB), with other members from Melbourne, Sydney, Amberley, Darwin and Tasmania.

One third of the group are on their first deployment.

Officer Commanding Major Gavin Cole said the group of about 70 did five weeks of pre-deployment training, which was a good step

to preparing them for their work duties overseas.

"A majority of my personnel do this day in and day out back home in Australia anyway so this is just a different location and different customers

with people forward in theatre," he said. "We are the agreed point from Australia to receive items, warehouse them and then push them forward to the task groups."

Maj Cole said his group

would be in the Middle East Region until April next year.

"My guys are mission-focused to ensure the task groups can complete their missions," he said.

"We understand that what

we are doing here assists the training and mentoring of other groups."

PSE-7 electronic technician Corporal Mark Macarthur is on his fifth deployment but first to the MER. His job is to

maintain communication instruments and protected weapons systems in all operating theatres in the MER.

"For the combat soldiers, the equipment we are getting is quite advanced, which really assists everyone out there and really ups our standard as an army," he said.

"For me personally, as more technology comes in, the job becomes a lot harder to grasp because we have to repair and maintain a lot more things out there, which can be interesting."

"Thankfully, we have enough equipment where, if something goes down, we're able to quickly swap things out and repair them."

Private Dominique Lopreti, 19, enlisted in the ADF last year and was posted to 10FSB last July.

This is her first deployment as part of PSE-7.

"I'm a very organised person so this job fits my personality," she said.

"At first my family were a bit freaked out about me deploying, but when I explained to them my role here in the Middle East they weren't so scared."
