Overview – Immediate Home Department Support

- Immediate support will be provided for establishing your Ministerial office by the Department of Finance (Finance) – your Home Department. We will meet your Office Manager as soon as practical to confirm the services and support required.
- **Ian Nicholas | 0409 744 766 AS**, Parliamentary and Corporate Engagement Branch is the key contact.

Departmental Liaison Officers

- Finance will deploy Departmental Liaison Officers (DLOs). To assist with the Ministerial office set-up, we will provide an interim DLO and liaise with your Chief of Staff on permanent placements.
- The interim DLO will be the point of contact for advice on requests for information and support from the Department, including briefing, responses to urgent correspondence and Cabinet engagement.

Security

- A security clearance is needed for access to the Finance IT network. Your connectivity will be handled as a priority and require a minimal level of personal information.
- We will contact office staff about requirements for getting a security clearance.
- The Finance portfolio deal with classified information. Security awareness and FOI briefings, and secure briefcases will be organised for your office (and home, if necessary) as a priority.

Media clips

- Finance uses Stroom for media monitoring, including a daily media briefing email on Finance portfolio areas of interest. Access to the daily media briefing email will be provided and your staff given training.

Equipment and support

- Finance VIP Support will provide a laptop, dual monitors, keyboard, mouse and an iPhone as a priority. They will also provide training on how to access the Finance network remotely.
- The Ministerial office at Parliament House will be provided with multifunction devices (printer/scanner) and Label printers (if required).
- Until the network can be installed in the Electorate office, Finance will provide you with a laptop and a printer for remote access and printing.
- We will work with your office on support including newspaper and periodical subscriptions and office equipment (e.g. security containers, secure bins and shredders).

Staffing arrangements

- Once allocated Government Personal Employee positions by the PM and staff are recruited, employment contracts will be processed by our Ministerial & Parliamentary Services Division.
- You will retain the same number of electorate officer positions in your new role.

Request to approve Determination 2022/14 - Travel for the purposes of packing up offices or briefings

Timing: Urgent – A number of *Members of Parliament (Staff) Act 1984* (MOP(S) Act) employees are seeking approval to travel.

Recommendation:

That you:

- i. **sign** the attached draft determination (Attachment A) to permit travel and payment of travel allowance (TA) for employees, who are in a deferral period:
 - for the purposes of packing up and/or moving their Parliamentarian's office, or
 - of the former Shadow Ministry to attend incoming policy or departmental briefings.

SIGNED / PLEASE DISCUSS

Key Issues:

Following the election and swearing in of the Prime Minister on 23 May 2022, a number of MOP(S) Act employees are now in a deferral period.

2. Currently Finance has an administrative arrangement to approve travel for employees on deferral. This arrangement requires approval by Finance prior to any travel being undertaken. The arrangement provides a level of assurance that MOP(S) Act employees are only travelling for limited purposes and for the minimal time required. Finance has processes to enable vetting and approval to occur on the same day.
3. Given the number of individuals likely needing to travel to Canberra or the location of an office of their former employing Parliamentarian to pack up and/or move their office or for individuals required to attend incoming policy or departmental briefings, your office requested a determination under the MOP(S) Act for your signature.
4. We understand that the Acting Prime Minister has authorised you to exercise powers under the MOP(S) Act.
5. We have prepared a draft determination, which permits travel for employees specified in the determination for specific purposes. This will allow those identified employees to travel to either Canberra or the location of an office of their employing Parliamentarian until 3 June 2022. A further determination can be made to extend the period, if required.
6. Once the determination is signed and consistent with past practice, it would be published on the Ministerial and Parliamentary Services website to provide transparency.

Risks

7. There is a risk that the draft determination reduces the level of scrutiny compared to the current administrative arrangements, which require the employee to provide Finance with details of their travel and obtain prior approval.

Financial Implications:

8. Costs can be met from the Electorate and Ministerial Support Costs appropriation.

Background:

9. Under the draft determination, employees within its scope would be automatically approved for travel and payment of TA based on the location of the travel.

10. The total of employee travel costs appears in reports of Parliamentarians expenditure published by the Independent Parliamentary Expenses Authority. This total will include any claims made under the proposed determination.

Consultation:

11. IPEA have been consulted in relation to the wording of the draft determination.

TRAVEL FOR EMPLOYEES

I, KATY GALLAGHER, Minister for Finance, for and on behalf of the Prime Minister determine under subsections 13(2) and 20(2) of the *Members of Parliament (Staff) Act 1984* that, with effect on and from the date of this determination that:

1. For those employees who were employed as at 20 May 2022, who are now subject to a deferral period, are permitted to travel for the purposes of packing up, and/or moving, their employing Parliamentarian's office, and the employee will be reimbursed for any travel expenses and paid the rate of travel allowance relevant to the location and the employee's classification for any travel to:
 - (a) Canberra; or
 - (b) the location of an office of the employing Parliamentarian provided at Commonwealth expenseuntil 3 June 2022.
2. For those employees who were employed by Shadow Ministers or Shadow Assistant Ministers as at 20 May 2022, who are now subject to a deferral period, are permitted to travel for the purposes attending incoming policy or departmental briefings, and the employee will be reimbursed for any travel expenses and paid the rate of travel allowance relevant to the location and the employee's classification for any travel to:
 - (c) Canberra; or
 - (d) the location of an office provided at Commonwealth expense.until 3 June 2022.
